DIRECTOR'S NOTES



Welcome to our 47th season here at The Black Rep. In a way, it can be said that the journey for the World Premiere of Hold On! to open our 47th Season, is a long time in the making. Paul Webb previously wrote 2014's film Selma and this is his adaptation of his own screenplay, for the stage. Robert Vaughn, from Theatrical Rights Worldwide, with whom I've been doing business for forty years, reached out to me, seeking my thoughts on this script. He said that Paul's agent was looking for someone to license it, and if I liked it, we could produce the World Premiere. I read this script, and thought "Wow, this is good storytelling!" We have a commitment to introduce new work, that I believe adds to the rich canon of African American literature for the stage. I believe this story perfectly aligns with that mission.

In 2015, I was in a production of All The Way, which is another story that features a battle of wills between Martin Luther King Jr and Lyndon Baines Johnson, except it's mostly from LBJ's perspective. Hold On! is the flip side of that same coin. This story is squarely from the lens of MLK, and other key figures of the civil rights movement, like John Lewis and Ralph Abernathy. More importantly, one of the things that really appealed to me was Coretta Scott King's role in the events of this story. The contribution of women in depictions of the movement is often neglected. We get a better sense of their contributions here, from the vantage points of Coretta and Annie Lee Cooper.

I'm the, the Henry Hampton artist in residence at Washington University. I think this is an open invitation, for people here in our community, to take advantage of the access we have to the archives, here in St. Louis, and build upon the years of storytelling that Henry gifted the world, through his documentaries like Eyes on the Prize. Right here in this city, there's a collection that features hours and hours of footage, and interviews that help make this history real for people. We need this history more than ever, because unfortunately a lot of the issues that Hold On! deals with are all to relevant, and prevalent to our lives today. Stories like this have a special kind of urgency and immediacy, in a world where the options for students to study Black literature and Black history, are being eliminated from school curriculums. This story we're telling shines a light on the importance of Black theatre and politics, and the role of Black theatre in remembering, celebrating, and uplifting our history.

I've been fortunate enough to collaborate with incredible creative team, and an awesome cast that has made this process a daily joy. Thank you for joining us, and marching with us on the journey!

PLAYWRIGHT



Paul Webb is a screenwriter and playwright best known for writing the screenplay of the 2014 film Selma. Webb was born in Britain and spent 10 years teaching then another 15 years working in the petrochemical industry before deciding to pursue a career in writing. When writing a draft for the screenplay of Lincoln for Steven Spielberg, the consultant was Doris Kearns Goodwin who is married to Richard Goodwin. Goodwin was the presidential advisor during the Johnson administration

known for writing the speech on the Voting Rights Act in 1965. After getting to know them Webb states, "So I decided here is the story I wanted to tell. I started reading about the era and about Johnson. But I soon realized that the man who had made it necessary to pass the legislation so urgently was Martin Luther King. The story which needed telling was the Selma voting rights campaign, in which he was central."
